



A fireplace stove is UL 737. A solid-fuel room heater or insert is UL 1482. The chimney connection still has to clear 801.7 and 801.10.

Original Masterbuild PE packet from Daily Code Talk #171. Confirm the adopted edition. New wood-burning residential hydronic heaters also need EPA certification. Distinct from 903 factory-built fireplaces and 904 pellet appliances.

☐ **905.1: listed and labeled, installed per the listing. Identify the exact type.**

Stoves, room heaters, and inserts are not interchangeable equipment.

☐ **905.2: connecting to a chimney flue serving a fireplace must comply with 801.7 and 801.10.**

Section 905 is not the end of the review path.

☐ **905.3: hearth extensions follow the stove listing, distinguishable from the floor. Listed hearths: UL 1618.**

A generic hearth detail that conflicts with the stove listing is the comment.

The hold we see first

Insert specified as a “stove,” UL 737 on the schedule, tied into a factory-built fireplace flue with no 801.10 listing, hearth that matches the floor.

What to send: stove vs heater vs insert, the cut sheet, and how it connects to the flue.

Send the comments. Not the County guideline.

Folio (does it start with 30?), process or UP number, and the comments PDF. Masterbuild will say which row is actually open.
